Session Title: The Practice of Leadership in the Educational Setting: Getting more out of what you have

This key-note address is designed for the established as well as the new and future leaders. This session will enable attendees to examine management and leadership styles and the most powerful tools available to managers and future leaders. Anthony Schembri is a former police commissioner, correction commissioner and Secretary of the Department of Juvenile Justice. He led departments of 14,000 sworn police officers. Appointed by 3 governors, two mayors, he was nominated for a \$100,000 award for Innovations in Government at Harvard. He is an author of a book on Leadership, Law Enforcement and as a Law Professor developed the first course on Corruption. He has lectured at Scotland Yard and ILEA. He is presently the Radzinowicz Professor of Criminology, Criminal Law & Police Science.

Session Title: D.A.R.E. Fentanyl Lessons and Community Partnership during the Continuing Opioid Crisis

Session Description: Discover how D.A.R.E. America is taking proactive steps to combat the escalating threat of the fentanyl crisis with innovative prevention education initiatives. Join us as we review our comprehensive Fentanyl Lesson and Presentation series, designed to equip D.A.R.E. Instructors and other LEOs with essential knowledge and strategies to address the lethal risks associated with fentanyl use. Learn about the development of targeted curricula, assembly presentations, and community outreach and partnership efforts aimed at raising awareness, dispelling misconceptions, and saving lives in the face of this urgent public health crisis.

Session Title: What You Need To Know About Child Human Trafficking

Session Description: This session will introduce the critical issue of child human trafficking, focusing on the recent "Operation March Sadness" in Polk County, Florida, as a case study. The speaker will provide insights into basics of risks and recognition of child human trafficking, the challenges faced in combating human trafficking, and the

importance of community awareness and intervention. Overall, the talk aims to empower attendees with knowledge and actionable insights to contribute to prevention and protection of children in their communities. Through increased awareness, intervention, and support, this session is meant to inspire positive change and advocate for the protection of vulnerable individuals.

Session Objectives:

- Case Study: Polk County, FL deputies conducted "Operation March Sadness," an undercover investigation into human trafficking and prostitution, arresting 228 people, including school teachers, coaches, and active duty military members.
- Identifying Vulnerable Populations: Discussion will center around the vulnerabilities exploited by traffickers, including poverty, lack of education, displacement, and social factors.
- Human Trafficking Dynamics: Attendees will gain insight into the tactics used by traffickers, such as grooming victims through social connections and false promises. The talk will explore the multifaceted nature of human trafficking, including both labor exploitation and commercial sexual exploitation.
- Collaboration and Support: Importance of collaborative efforts between law enforcement agencies, local organizations, and social services in combating human trafficking.
